

Syllabus for Pastoral Liturgics Spring 2017 (EP 152)

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This course will offer students the opportunity to explore current liturgical practices in the Episcopal Church in relation to their pastoral significance and potency in providing important hermeneutical grounding for daily Christian life. Topics to be explored include the nature of ritual and its power in human society, the role of the minister in leading pastoral liturgies, and the importance of addressing the pastoral needs of ethnic, cultural, and generational subsets of a faith community through liturgical practices. Students will receive hands-on experience in leading the pastoral offices of the 1979 Book of Common Prayer and the Book of Occasional Services.

Student Learning Objectives

Students in this class are expected to

1. Develop an understanding of the complex role ritual plays in human societies
2. Develop proficiency with the pastoral rites of the 1979 BCP
3. Develop an understanding of particular pastoral issues related to gender, ethnicity, age, and ableness and how these may be addressed within the context of the worship life of a community
4. Develop proficiency in designing rites that speak to the pastoral needs of a faith community
5. Articulate a basic understanding of the historical and theological development of the pastoral rites of the '79 BCP

Evaluation

1. Eight Weekly one page double spaced 12 pt. reading summaries that identify two central ideas in the reading assignment and reflect on some aspect of the readings for the week which you want to ponder further (33% of grade)-demonstrating competency in objectives 1-5
2. A comprehensive 3 hour timed final exam to be returned by 5 p.m. May 6th the last day of classes, or by 11:59 p.m on April 23 for those graduating (33% of grade)-demonstrating competency in objectives 1-5
3. A fifteen page academic research paper (not a project) using at least five different sources (approximately 250 pages of reading) on some topic related to ritual and pastoral care which you wish to explore more fully. This topic must have a direct relationship to some liturgical aspect of pastoral care, not a generalized topic in pastoral care. This paper is due Monday April 10 by 11:59 p.m. (33% of grade) Competency in any of the above objectives may be demonstrated through this paper.
